Medical Risk Assessment and Medical Plan

INTRODUCTION

Penicuik Athletic Football Club ('the Club') is a member of the East of Scotland Football Association.

It is the policy of the club to take all reasonable and practicable steps to safeguard the Health and Safety and welfare of all volunteers involved with the club and to protect all other persons who visit our club against hazards to Health or Safety arising out of the Clubs activities.

This document combines the Medical Risk Assessment and Medical Plan. It addresses:

- Organisation and infrastructure relating to medical matters
- Identifiable risks and how these are controlled
- General provisions for medical care

INFRASTRUCTURE AND ORGANISATION

Access for Emergency Vehicles

Penicuik Athletic's ground at Penicuik Park is situated within Penicuik Public Park. Access is through a controlled entrance opposite 'Penicuik Centre' on Carlops Road. The access is controlled by three 'drop down' bollards of which PAFC holds the key for one of the three. By dropping one bollard access is directly available by emergency vehicles to all areas of the park. Access to the pitch and spectator areas is by the large gate at the John Street side of the park. PAFC have plans in place as part of their Safety Plan to facilitate this access.

First Aid Facilities

The principal first aid room is situated within the main changing room area of the 'Pavilion' complex but is immediately accessible from the entrance corridor and does not require access through either dressing room or any part of the building.

It contains basic first aid equipment, a couch and water supplies. There are toilets (including an accessible toilet) within the 'Pavillion' complex. The list of Medical Equipment both on site and in the Medical Kit Bag is attached to this plan as Appendix 1.

Organisation and Personel

Penicuik Athletic ("the club") has an association with a Doctor for advice and guidance on all medical matters. The Doctor is in attendance for major matches (where attendance of greater than 1000 is anticipated). The club also ensures that there is at least one qualified First Aid staff member present at all matches.

There is an announcer present at every home match. This person will be located at the main entrance to the ground and is the focal point for co-ordination of messages during the match. He/she will make any safety announcements and will have immediate access to a telephone to communicate with others including the emergency services to ensure expedited management of any health and safety issues in conjunction and on the advice of the Club Safety Officer.

Safety Policy document should be read in conjunction with this document.

Purpose

This Medical Risk Assessment is a report that shows the club's potential medical vulnerabilities, to provide a summary of defensive measures, and assess the amount of risk the club is willing to accept (the risk tolerance).

The nearest Accident & Emergency Department is at the Royal Infirmary Edinburgh, which is 25-30 minutes from the ground under normal traffic conditions. The first-aider looking after an injured player will make arrangements through the Matchday Co-ordinator either to arrange transport for a player to the infirmary for further assessment or to call the emergency services if immediate medical care is required.

This risk assessment was completed taking into consideration the following factors:

The physical infrastructure assets of the club: a pavilion, covered spectator areas, floodlights, a perimeter fence and sports pitch fence round the football pitch, secure gates to the football ground and an upgrade to facilities. Travel to away matches has also to be considered.

Therefore, physical harm to human beings has been considered in tandem with these assets and travel situations.

Appendix 1

Medical Kit Bag contents

- One guidance card & contents card
- Individually wrapped sterile & waterproof adhesive dressings (assorted sizes), appropriate to the club environment
- Sterile eye pads, with attachment
- Six individually wrapped triangular bandages
- Safety pins
- Medium & large sized, individually wrapped, sterile un-medicated wound dressings
- 2 Antiseptic tissues, sterile water or saline in sealed disposable containers
- If emergency blankets are provided, store alongside equipment & in such a way as to keep them free from dust & damp.
- Disposable aprons and plastic gloves should be provided near the first aid materials
- Blunt ended scissors should be kept where there is a possibility that clothing or material needs to be cut.
- Plastic disposable bags for soiled or used first-aid dressings should be provided.
- Individually wrapped sterile adhesive dressings (non-allergic / waterproof)
- One large sterile un-medicated dressing
- Individually wrapped moist cleansing wipes
- 2 Defibrillator
- ! Ice Spray
- Heat Spray
- Spray Bottle for Iced water
